George Burns and Gracie Allen will pay a return visit to the "Paul Whiteman Presents . . ." program, starring Dinah Shore, on Sunday at 8 p. m. (EWT) over WEAF.

A pickup from a Nazi internment camp in Texas and a first-hand report by foreign correspondent Cecil Brown on the temper of the American people will highlight the "We, the People" program on Sunday at 7:30 p. m., EWT, over WABC.

Howard Hanson, noted American conductor, composer and educator, will be the guest conductor on the Chautauqua Symphony orchestra concert to be broadcast over WJZ on Sunday at 4:30 p. m., EWT.

So that John Charles Thomas might be first to sing "A Love Like This" on the air, the Thomas program for Sunday at 2:30 p. m., EWT, over WEAF has been rearranged. "A Love Like This" was written by Victor Young, the

gifted maestro who conducts the orchestra heard on the Thomas show.

Music by Gershwin, Friml, Romberg and Offenbach, favorites every one, will highlight the Sunday broadcast of "The Family Hour," starring Eileen Farrell, Mack Harrell and Al Goodman's orchestra over WABC at 5 p. m. (EWT).

Two songs from the new film-musical "This Is the Army" and a performance by Dick Haymes of "It Can't Be Wrong"—now approaching the 1,000,000 mark in sales on record form—will distinguish the "Here's to Romance" program on Sunday at 6:05 p. m., EWT, over WJZ.

Dennis Day, long a favorite song-star of the Jack Benny program, branches out as a dramatic actor on the "Silver Theatre" broadcast over WABC Sunday at 6 p. m., EWT. He will be starred in a laugh-packed story entitled "Niagara to Reno."

The story of a retired school teacher, whose inactivity has made her almost neurotic, will be told Sunday on WEAF's Red Cross program, "That They Might Live," (12:30 p. m. EWT).
