

# March Of Time Returns To Air In Broadcast Thursday

"Should The United States Give Up Its Foreign Military Bases After The War?" Subject For Discussion

In a world where the fate of nations swings with the pendulum each day, and events—tragic, significant, far-reaching—scream for man's attention, the "March of Time" returns to the air with its dramatized news and "people who make the news" Thursday over WEAf at 10:30 p. m. (EWT.) Appearing in person on the broadcast will be Lt. Col. William T. Ryder who landed with paratroops in Sicily; Allan Kastrup, Swedish political editor who will report on conditions in Germany, and John Carson, author of "Under Cover," who will expose Fascist underground activities in the U. S.

"Should the United States Give Up Its Foreign Military Bases after the War?" will be the pertinent subject discussed on "American Town Meeting of the Air" over WJZ on Thursday, at 8:30 p. m., EWT. The broadcast will originate in the amphitheatre at Chautauqua, N. Y.

The screen actress Joan Blondell, the singing stars Connie Haines and Morton Downey and the pugilist-turned-comedian Slapsie Maxie Rosenbloom are the "Stage Door Canteen" guests for the broadcast on Thursday, at 9:30 p. m., EWT, over Station WABC.
