30 PCT. SLASH IN NEWSPRINT SEEN POSSIBLE

MURRAY BAY, Que., Aug. 20 — (UP) — A shortage of pulpwood amounting to 3,750,000 cords in the United States and Canada, which would force a 30 per cent cut in the amount of newsprint available for newspapers, books and magazines, was seen as a possibility today by members of a special house sub-committee investigating the newsprint supply.

Increased demand for paper in other fields because of the war was emphasized by Rep. Clarence J. Brown, R., O., a member of the committee.

"War has increased the demand for paper," he said, not only for direct purposes but to replace critical metals like steel and tin. The use of glass, another substitute, has made necessary greater amount of paper for packing."
