

WIBA to Air All Russian Musical Program at 4 Today

The American premiere of the "Concerto for Harp and Orchestra" by Reinhold Gliere is the featured work on the all-Russian program of the NBC Symphony orchestra, to be heard at 4 o'clock today over WIBA. Featured as the solo harpist will be Edward Vito, first harpist of the orchestra.

The harp concerto was written before the outbreak of the war in Russia, but has not yet been performed outside the Soviet Union. The composer, one of the outstanding Soviet artists, is a professor at the Moscow conservatory.

The other numbers on the program are "Polovetzian Dances" from "Prince Igor" by Borodin, and an orchestral transcription by Frank Black of two Rachmaninoff preludes.

Another musical treat scheduled for 2 p. m. today is the appearance of the world-renowned pianist, Josef Hofmann, as soloist on the N. Y. Philharmonic-Symphony broadcast over WBBM. Hofmann will play Beethoven's Fourth Piano Concerto in G major. The balance of the program consists of the overture to Goldoni's comedy, "Le Baruffe Chiozzote" by Siniaglia; Duka's "La Peri," and Ravel's "La Valse."

The intermission feature of the concert will be the recitation of George Washington's "Farewell Address" by the English actor, Cecil Humphreys.
