## MEDICAL TEST IS SCHEDULED

BLUFFTON, Oct. 29 — In line with accelerated educational programs and in cooperation with the Association of American Medical Colleges, Bluffton college is giving the medical aptitude test at College hall at 3 p. m., Nov. 5, to college students and high school seniors planning to study medicine, it has been announced by Dean J. S. Schultz.

The new departure in the association plan is the opening of the aptitude test to high school seniors; heretofore only college students taking premedical training were eligible.

Bluffton college, acting in behalf of the association will admit any high school senior from this region to the test. It has nothing to do with the local program of the college.
