Honoring the 173rd anniversary of the birth of Beethoven, Leopold Stokowski conducts the Symphony Orchestra in his "Fifth Symphony" on the concert Sunday, (WEAF, 4 p. m. EST.) Also programmed are the works of two modern composers—the Introduction and Ballet from the opera "Ramuntcho" by Deems Taylor and "Chant of 1942" by Paul Creston.
