## RECOGNITION OF BOLIVIA DOUBTED

LONDON, Jan. 10 — (AP) — Early British recognition of the revolutionary government of Bolivia is improbable, and certainly any action would be taken only after full consultation with the United States, it is believed in London.

Frank King, British Press-assn diplomatic correspondent, referring to Secretary of State Cordell Hull's statement that influences outside Bolivia had a part in the revolution there, wrote that Nazi "cells" in Argentina had a fertile field in Bolivia.

He described Augusto Cespedes, secretary general of the new government, as owner of an anti-Jewish, pro-Nazi newspaper, and said other ministers include "ambitious militarists and pro-Axis politicians."
