STIMSON FAILS TO SHOW NEED OF LABOR DRAFT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—(UP)—Members of the senate military affairs committee said generally today that Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson had failed to show conclusive need for the national service legislation requested by President Roosevelt to curb wartime strikes.

Stimson, endorsing the pending Austin-Wadsworth bill to conscript men and women for non-combat service, told the committee yesterday that members of the armed forces demanded such legislation, that the public wanted it and that the big job now was to impress congress of its need.

Most committee members who heard Stimson agreed that many servicemen and a large number of civilians were resentful over wartime strikes and threats of strikes. But they disagreed that labor conscription was the answer.
