## Mattison Urges Return to Cities

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Walter J. Mattison, chairman of the post-war planning committee of the National Institute of Municipal Law Officers, said Wednesday that the immediate problem facing the nation's cities is to eliminate slum areas and to start a trend of population back toward the center of cities.

Mattison, city attorney of Milwaukee, told the house public buildings and grounds committee that the movement of urban population heretofore has been outward from the center of cities, making them spread out more. He said that trend meant "a terrific economic loss to the community as . . . facilities and services have to be duplicated many times over to take care of the sprawling municipality."
