margaline' A major food chain survey shows that you will have 25 per cent fewer points for rationed foods now than you spent on those foods before. The survey concludes this reduction will slow up beef marketing, since butcher buys the carcass, therefore must sell his rationed cuts in order to have unrationed cuts

for you. Office of Price Administration meat planners answer that you may have slightly fewer points to spend for rationed items now, but all things considered, it is almost certainly not a reduction; of 25 per cent. A slight reduction of points in hand to buy sationed foods would be matched by reduced values on butter and oleómargarine, plus a monthly average of ten unused points, stored up in tokens since their use bagan in February, So you!
