Home Front Forecasts

Worried about how far your reduced number of red points will take you in buying rationed beef, cheese, butter and oleomargarine?

A major food chain survey shows that you will have 25 per cent fewer points for rationed foods now than you spent on those foods before. The survey concludes this reduction will slow up beef marketing, since the butcher buys the carcass, therefore must sell his rationed cuts in order to have unrationed cuts for you.

Office of Price Administration meat planners answer that you may have slightly fewer points to spend for rationed items now, but all things considered, it is almost certainly not a reduction of 25 per cent. A slight reduction of points in hand to buy rationed foods would be matched by reduced values on butter and oleomargarine, plus a monthly average of ten unused points stored up in tokens since their use began in February. So you are probably as well healed with points for ration shopping as before.

OPA marketing experts don't expect the reduction of unrationed beef cuts for sale as pre-
