

Cinderella Girl Is Sleuth On "Ellery Queen" Mystery

Gloria Halliday, 19-year-old contralto, who is one of the three finalists in the "Hour of Charm's" search for America's Singing Cinderella, will be a guest armchair detective on "The Adventures of Ellery Queen" Saturday (WEAF, 7:30 p. m., EWT).

The mystery Miss Halliday will try to solve is called "The Case of the Corpse in Lower 5." In it Queen encounters a series of clues on a mysterious transcontinental train ride and before the journey is over he finds murder, loses something that irrefutable logic says could not be lost, and finally, of course, figures out the whole thing.
