Many old-style Chinese boats have had eyes painted on the front, or prow, and a Chinese once explained this by saying, "If boat no have eyes, it no can see."

Perhaps it was the same idea which led some of the ancient Greeks to decorate their boats with eyes. The eyes were of large size, being more than a foot wide in certain cases. With an eye on each side of the prow, the front of the boat looked rather like the head of a swimming animal.

The rivers in Greece played only a small part in the country's commerce in ancient times. Thousands of miles of sea coast were within easy reach of the people, and their boats were used chiefly for sailing on the sea.
