WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The last words they heard from Sgt. Joseph C. Specker were:

"I'm running out of these damned Jerries."

Joe was a combat engineer. On the night of Jan. 7, 1944, near Mount Porchia, Italy, he went forward despite heavy German fire on reconnaissance and learned there was a machine gun and a cluster of German snipers in the path of a group of infantrymen who were about to jump off in an assault.

It wasn't Joe's job to clean out the Germans but he volunteered.

"I'll get plenty of business up there," he said. So he took off with a box of ammunition for a protective ledge on a hill.

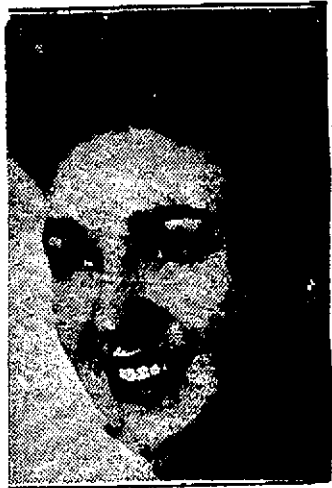
