## GOP PROSPECTS REPORTED GOOD IN TWO STATES

NEW YORK, July 22—(AP)—Herbert Brownell, Jr., chairman of the Republican National committee, said today he had received reports of "tremendous enthusiasm" and "bright prospects" for the Dewey-Bricker ticket in Oregon and Massachusetts, and that electoral votes of the entire northwest might go to the Republicans.

Brownell said at a press conference that the reports concerning the election chances of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Gov. John Bricker of Ohio as GOP presidential and vice presidential candidates came from U. S. Sen. Sinclair Weeks of Massachusetts and Ralph Cake, national committeeman from Oregon.

Brownell said he would leave
