

# Fu Manchu Drama Slated For New Radio Version

Occidental ingenuity is pitted against the Oriental craft of that master of crime, "The Insidious Dr. Fu Manchu," in a Mystery theatre version of Sax Rohmer's story on NBC at 9 p. m. Tuesday.

## SEVEN CAP BOYS IN SPECIAL WORK

### Local Cadets Take Course At Patterson Field

Seven Civil Air Patrol cadets from the Lima CAP unit are at Patterson field near Dayton participating in the 10-day indoctrination course of the Air Service Command.
