

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz Speaks From Pearl Harbor

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, will speak from Pearl Harbor on the "March of Time" program Thursday, (WEAF 10:30 p. m., EWT.)

Admiral Nimitz, speaking to help observe the 31st anniversary of Naval aviation, will give the latest news on naval action in the Pacific and tell of the progress of this branch of the service in the Pacific area.

Y., over Station WJZ, Thursday at 8:30 p. m. Speaking for the affirmative will be Brig. Gen. H. C. Holdridge, U. S. Army retired, former professor of history at West Point, and now writer on economics and history for leading magazines; and Representative Forest A. Harness, Republican, of Indiana. Arguing against limitation of tenure of the presidential office will be Norman Cousins, editor of the Saturday Review of Literature, and Representative Albert Gore, Democrat, of Tennessee. Clifton Utley, news commentator, will preside as moderator, while George V. Denny, Jr., founder and regular moderator of the series, takes a two-week vacation in California.
