## CONTINUATION OF RATIONING IN NEWSPRINT SEEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 — (INS) — Newspaper publishers were reported by the War Production Board today to have recommended that government printing and publishing limitation orders be continued after victory-in-Europe day until newsprint is in "reasonably adequate supply."

The WPB said that the publishers made that recommendation at their conference with WPB officials in Washington last Wednesday and Thursday.

While the official statement represented WPB officials as believing publishers should not look for any significant relief in the domestic newsprint situation by anticipating large shipment of newsprint or wood pulp from Scandinavia after V-E day, WPB chiefs were quoted as having hope for some relief from that source.

Swedish industrialists, WPB officials stated, have reported that they can ship 100,000 tons of news-
