## 8,000 WORKERS ARE SENT HOME

PATERSON, N. J., Oct. 5 — (AP) — The Wright Aeronautical Corp. said today that 8,000 workers on all shifts at the company's Woodridge plant have been sent home from their jobs and that production of cyclone engines for B-29 Super-Fortresses was "crippled."

The company said the workers were sent home because there was "no adequate supervision" at the plant as a result of a walkout of supervisory employes who are members of an independent union.
