NICK AND NORA CHARLES, the adventurous couple of Dashiell Hammett's detective fiction, really plunge into the lower depths when they encounter murder and mystery in "The Case of the Gruesome G-String," during the broadcast of another episode in the "Adventures of the Thin Man," to be aired over KGLO-CBS on Friday, at 7:30 p. m.

The death of one Serena Barton places ick and Nora where they like to be—at a night club and in the thick of a mystery. Suspects multiply as the astute couple attempt to trace the source of the rare poison which caused the murder. When Nora finds a G-String where it was never intended to be—wrapped around her own throat with intent to strangle, and Nick traces a horn player to a dope den in Harlem, the action becomes most merry and mystifying. A claustrophobic chorus girl, addicted to the study of astrology, provides the final clue for a smash-bang clearing up of the problems.
