Wallace Votes by Mail for Straight FR Ticket

DETROIT — (U.P.) — Vice-Pres. Henry A. Wallace voted Friday, by marking his absentee ballot, for mailing to his Iowa election board and told reporters, "Of course, I voted the straight Democratic ticket."

In the second day of a Michigan campaign tour, the vice-president told newsmen he is confident Pres. Roosevelt will carry the state by more than 100,000 votes.
