487,692 LISTED AS CASUALTIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)
— United States battle casualties
have risen to 487,692, an increase
of 14,913 over the number re-
ported last week.

The War department said today
the latest Army total is 417,121
as of Oct. 21, an increase of 14-
047 since last week's report, which
covered the period thru Oct. 14.

The latest Navy compilation
placed the figure at 70,571, an in-
crease for the same interval
of 866.
