13TH DEFICIT BUDGET OFFERED BY ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10—(UP)—President Roosevelt yesterday sent to congress his 13th consecutive deficit budget covering the fiscal year 1946 which begins next July 1.

This budget will report actual expenditures in the fiscal year 1944, which ended last June 30. It will report new estimates of expenditures in the 1945 fiscal year, which has just under six months
