OHIO PAYROLLS SHOW DECLINE

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 17 -(INS)-Ohio's industrial payrolls and employment records declined one per cent from September to October, 1944, Ohio State university's Bureau of Business Research and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics revealed today. The report was based on records of 8.367 Ohio firms.

Manufacturing employment increases from September to October were one per cent in Canton and less than one per cent in Declines Cleveland. than one per cent in Akron and Dayton, and two per cent in Cincinnati, Columbus, Toledo Youngstown.

Cleveland with one per cent and Dayton with five per cent were the only chief cities to have higher manufacturing payrolls in October than in September. Declines were 10 per cent in Akron, four per cent in Canton, five per cent in Cincinnati, one per cent in Columbus, 10 per cent in Toledo, and three per cent in Youngstown.
