VERYAN, Cornwall, Feb. 3 — (U.P.)—More devil-scaring houses—round buildings topped by a cross—to guard the entrances to this village are to be erected from a \$23,000 bequest in the will of a local alderman.

Alderman Tom Blaney, "prouder and fonder" of his birthplace than of anything else in life, left his entire fortune to the village and its people when he died recently, aged 70. He was the last of a family of ancient lineage which has been associated with the village for many centuries.

His will provided for a playing field, the construction of a harbor near the village, local charities and village families who were his friends, and left two-ninths of his property to the vicar, and his home and one-ninth to the National Trust.
