

# Yangtze River Tragedies Come To Life On Radio

China's "Old Man River," the great Yangtze, comes to life in a gripping epic on WEAf's "Pacific Story" at 10:30 p. m. Sunday, Lima time. The half-hour drama deals with the tragedies of flood and war, the central characters being hardy Chinese of the merchant junks who are swept into the boiling waters of gorges and rapids.

## IMPERSONATOR FACES CHECK WRITING CHARGE

CLEVELAND, Feb. 17—(AP)—Robert Hollander of Seattle was held here today on federal charges of impersonating a Nicaraguan diplomat and cashing two spurious checks at Canton, O., the FBI office said today.

An FBI officer said Hollander was known variously as Victor Gluck, Martin Gruenborn, Martin Robert Gruenbom, Robert Nagel, Victor Hillman and Robert West-offen; and was arrested Feb. 9 in Seattle, where he lived under the name of Gruenborn.

Hollander admitted, the FBI officer said, that he masqueraded in Canton in March 1944 as a vice consul of the Nicaraguan legation, and cashed two worthless checks.

He was sentenced to a five-year term in San Quentin prison in 1921, the FBI representative said,
