

# Activities Of Black Market Gang Told On FBI Story

A thrilling expose of how gangland mobsters have been making off with "Black Market Billions" because of wartime difficulties forms the behind-the-scenes dramatization of "The FBI in Peace and War" series at 7:30 p. m. Saturday over Station WABC. The story, based on Frederick L. Collins' popular book, "The FBI in Peace and War," shows how the G-men finally rounded up a gang of racketeers who were making capital out of the gullibility of Americans.
