School Finances On Docket Again

COLUMBUS, Apr. 17—(UP)—The problem of school finances comes up in the Ohio General assembly again tomorrow when the house education committee is scheduled to take up the Tarr bill to give schools approximately \$100,000,000 during the next two years.

This committee hearing may give some indication as to the amount which house leaders believe local school districts should receive from the state. Most of them believe the \$111,000,000 provided by the Daniels senate bill is too high.
