

Peace Conference Report Scheduled On Saturday

A "Report from the San Francisco Conference" will inaugurate a series of programs on the "Our Foreign Policy" series, Saturday, over WEAf at 6 p. m. from the west coast during the United Nations' Security conference.

U. S. To Adhere To Geneva Pact

WASHINGTON, Apr. 28—(AP) — Notwithstanding mistreatment of American prisoners by Germany and Japan, the War department reiterated to congress today its determination to abide by the Geneva convention covering prisoners of war.

Brig. Gen. R. W. Berry, deputy assistant chief of staff, told the house military committee the Geneva convention was a part of the supreme law of the United States and so long as it was, the department has no choice but to abide by it.
