"Should the German People Be Held Responsible for the Crimes of Their Nazi Leaders?" Two authorities say "Yes," and two other

experts reply with an equally emphatic "No," when "America's Town Meeting" considers that question in its broadcast over Station WJZ Thursday at 8:30 p. m. Stanley High, author and roving editor of the Reader's Digest, and William L. Shirer, radio news commentator and author of "Berlin Diary," join in the feeling that the crimes of Germany are the crimes of the people as a whole. In favor of confining punishment to members of the Nazi party are Dr. George N. Shuster, author of "Germany—A Short History" and president of Hunter college, and Gerhart Segar, editor of Neue Volkszeitung, co-author of "Germany—To Be or Not To Be," former member of the German Reich-

stag and now a citizen of the United States. George V. Denny, Jr., will serve as moderator of this forum, which will be held in Buffalo, N. Y.

As a contribution to the nationwide celebration of Infantry Day on June 15, the broadcast of "Arch Oboler's Plays" of Thursday, at 10 p. m. over WOR will present an original radio drama, "Mr. Pyle," a eulogy of the late, great war correspondent, Ernie Pyle, whose writings so graphically depicted the tribulations of the U. S. Army's foot-soldiers—the men of the Infantry.
