

Inside Story Of Radar Will Be Related On ASF Broadcast

Radar, the mechanical bloodhound which finds enemy ships, airplanes and fortifications thru darkness, fog or camouflage, will be the subject of the Army Service Forces "Weapons for Victory," in its broadcast Thursday at 5 p. m. over WABC. Only the final defeat of Japan has made it possible to tell the real inside story of radar, one of the most carefully guarded secret weapons of World War II.
