

Leonardo DaVinci, Scientist, To Be Aired Wednesday Night

The story of one of the greatest practical scientists of all time, Leonardo DaVinci, will be told on "The Human Adventure" in its broadcast at 9 p. m. Wednesday over WOR.

Living in the 16th century, DaVinci earned lasting fame in many fields. He painted the Mona Lisa, The Last Supper, and many other masterpieces. He originated the science of hydraulics, made important studies in mathematics, meteorology and even in aviation. As an engineer, he built the Martesana Canal and many military installations. As an architect he helped in the construction of the Milan Cathedral.
