NEW YORK, Jan. 2—(INS)—

In this, the turn of our first year after victory, let us dedicate ourselves to promote a better understanding and forbearance among our fellow countrymen, to fulfill the realization of American ideals and hopes for unity in essential things, liberty in non-essential things, and charity in all things.

Let us pledge ourselves to stop the growth of the cancer of bigotry penetrating American life, shriveling America's heart, retarding America's peace.

It is not only patriotic to try to cure this virulent disease. It is essential to do so if America is to remain America.

For bigotry undermines the fundamental principles avowed in the Declaration of Independence, the constitution and the bill of rights—the human and humane documents which chartered and charted a new way of living—our American way of life!

And the first step which each of us must take to eliminate selfishness, harshness, injustice and contempt from the hearts and minds of others is to make sure that they have no place in our own.
