

Fields and McCarthy Battle On Radio Broadcast Sunday

W. C. Fields meets his radio nemesis, Charlie McCarthy, whom he threatens to cut up into venetian blinds at 8 p. m. Sunday over NBC. A rare and hard-to-get guest on the airwaves, this is W. C. Fields' first visit with Charlie in two years. Charlie is counting on support from his pals Edgar Bergen, Ray Noble and Anita Gordon.

Charlie fell victim to Fields trickery not long ago and wound up as caddy for "Bugle Beak." As a golfer, McCarthy wants it known, Fields would do better to fill up his nose with helium and rent it out for a barrage balloon.

Degnan Kidnap Tie-Up Spiked

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Mar. 23 —(UP)—Possibility that James Wright McDowell, 27, of Peoria, Ill., being held here under \$50,000 bond on charges of attempting to kidnap two 7-year old girls, may have had some connection with the sensational Degnan kidnaping case in Chicago was spiked here today by Detective Chief John Siers.

Siers said the youth, a member of a prominent Illinois family, had been a resident of St. Petersburg since early in December, 1945, and that he could have had no connection with the Chicago crime. Siers issued the statement following published rumors linking the two cases.

McDowell was charged yesterday with the attempted kidnaping of two young St. Petersburg girls. Police said the girls told how McDowell lured them into his car by
