

Dramatic Opera to be Given 'Over Theatre of the Air'

Forty-five hundred music enthusiasts attending the 17th annual Chicago music festival will comprise the audience in the **Medinah Temple** when the "Chicago Theatre of the Air" presents Mascagni's melodious and dramatic opera, "Cavalleria Rusticana," at 10 p. m. **Saturday**, over MBS.

Marion Claire, prima donna of the "Chicago Theatre" series, will be heard in the role of Santuzza, with Richard Tucker, Metropolitan Opera tenor, co-starring as Turridu, the man who first loved and then spurned her.

Because listeners who heard the thrilling "Stardust" production number on a recent broadcast of the "Dick Haymes Show," and others who were moved by comments about the number urged that it be aired again, the production in its entirety will be repeated over the "baritone's" half hour musical show at 8 p. m. **Saturday**.

Vision" at 3:30 p. m. **Saturday** over MBS.

Bill Slater, sports announcer and quiz show emcee, will represent the men of America, and Dorothy Kilgallen, Broadway columnist and radio showmistress, will lend the weight of her wit to the women's side when they appear as guests on the round table of romance, "Leave It To the Girls" at 9 p. m. **Saturday** over MBS.

Howard Dietz will appear as guest quizee when he joins the regular panel of experts on the radio version of the old parlor game, "Twenty Questions" to be heard at 8 p. m. **Saturday** over MBS.
