Laurence Olivier and Ralph Richardson, members of London's world famous Old Vic Theater Co., currently performing for six weeks in New York, are the stars of two Old Vic broadcasts on CBS. Olivier plays the title role in Shakespeare's "Richard III" to be heard at 1 p. m. today on WBBM, and Richardson stars in Ibsen's "Peer Gynt" next Sunday at the same time. These broadcasts are Old Vic's first in America and the only ones the company will make during its current stay.
