

# Surprise Plan Backfires On MBS Saturday Show

Editor Jonathan Trimble of the Bellport Enquirer falls in love with one of those brand new 1905 phonographs and plans a surprise for his wife's 20th wedding anniversary dinner, only to have his scheme backfire in the "Jonathan Trimble, Esq." comedy drama to be heard at 8:30 p. m. Saturday over MBS.

Jonathan, as played by Gale Gordon, gives his new thing-a-ma-gig a workout with some of the most popular discs of 40-odd years ago—the "Flogging Scene" from "Uncle Tom's Cabin" (with incidental musical effects), an address by the late President McKinley at the Pan-American Exposition, are a few of the records played.

gelo Raffaelli, tenor, both of whom have made frequent appearances on the "Chicago Theatre of the Air" operatic series, will be soloists on the program's summer concert at 9 p. m. Saturday over MBS.

Colonel Stoopnagel, whose wit is usually on the timid side, will defend the males of America against the cutting wisecracks of the feminine round table which answers listeners' queries on marriage and romance at 8 p. m. Saturday over MBS on "Leave It To The Girls."
