

Today's Aces Special Broadcasts

Because of the broadcasts of the atom bomb tests, scheduled programs may be cancelled or reshuffled today to bring listeners special broadcasts of the event, the time of which is necessarily somewhat indefinite.

The actual explosion of the bomb on the fleet of ships near Bikini atoll will be about 3:30 p. m. Central Standard Time, with broadcasts to start earlier.

The event will be relayed through a four-network pool by word-pictures punctuated by actual sounds, including the blast. Preceding the explosion, listeners will be primed for the target-hit by a pickup of the metronome ticking over the bombardier's objective.

The first 4 minutes of the broadcast will be given over to an introductory talk from San Francisco, after which the program will be switched to the Pacific.

From aboard the Appalachian, Larry Tighe will tell what is expected to happen; from the observation plane, Bill Downs, the only correspondent aboard, will give another preliminary description; Don Bell will interview navy officials on the McKinley; and Cleo Roberts on the Panamint will interview scientists for their views. W. W. Chaplin, at Kwajalein, will describe the air operations base. With the approach of the zero hour, the voice of the bombardier will be heard talking his way over the target, with all accompanying intercommunication talk in the plane.

During the day and evening, the individual networks will carry their own programs based on the bomb tests. These include Bill Downs' description of the first bomb plane takeoff about 12:30 p. m., his interview with the pilot and bombardier about 6 p. m., and his account of the test at 9:30 p. m. all on WBBM; an "Operation Crossroads" program at 1 p. m., another at 2 p. m., and a follow-up at 8:30 p. m., all on WGN. In addition, the tests will be the subject for dramatizations, and other programs through the day.
