## Detroit Warns Boys' Wolfish Tactics Illegal

DETROIT, July 26—(INS) — Boys, you can't be a wolf in Detroit—not even a little one.

Detroit police warn today that an 1870 ordinance against "ogling" has been brought into play.

"Ogling," according to the Detroit law and Webster's dictionary, means "to cast glances or to gaze or stare amorously."

The ancient law states:

"No persons shall improperly, lewdly, wantonly or wrongfully accost, ogle, insult, annoy, follow, pursue, lay hand on or by gesture, movement of the body or otherwise wrongfully molest a person in any lane, street, alley, square, park or space in the city."
