Seven Austrians Reported Jailed by Reds

VIENNA (U.P.)—A government spokesman reported Saturday that the Russians had arrested seven Austrian officials in connection with the transfer of German property to its proper owners.

Those arrested included two assembly members, one official of the ministry of property control, and four officials of the transfer agency handling German property.

The two assembly members were released within four hours but the others were said to be in custody.

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
