Powdered Coal Engine Announced by Allis-Chalmers

MILWAUKEE (U.P.) Develop-ment of a gas turbine which will drive locomotives fueled by coal ground to the fineness of face ground to the fineness of face powder was announced today by Allis-Chalmers Co.

Allis-Unalmers Co. Company officials said the firm expects to run tests on the new type locomotive within two years. In the new type power mechan-ism, ordinary coal will be pulver-ized and shot directly into a com-bustor to be burned under high pressure. As a result super-heated gases at 1,300 degrees fahrenheit will drive a generator which in turn will power electric The motors will furnish tual power to the wheels. will power electric motors. motors will furnish the ac-

The company said the drive system will have a shaft efficiency of about 24 per cent, making the unit "the most efficient single-shaft gas turbine in this country."
