Priority Plan Alarms Steel

NEW YORK, Sept. 5—(INS)—Iron Age said today that steel officials are becoming alarmed over the priority system imposed on steel production for peacetime output.

The industry's publication said the priority system, which proved such a miserable failure during the war that it was replaced by a complex and successful controlled materials, plan appears well on its way toward wrecking a balanced distribution of steel products.

The publication asserted that "if the current trend in preference ratings under the present system continues the same results will occur which took place during early wartime days when more tickets were issued than there were seats in the theatre."
