## U. W. Objects to Left Turn Ban at Park

A new objection to the proposed elimination of left turns by motor vehicles on University ave. at Park st. was disclosed today when A. F. Gallistel, University of Wisconsin superintendent of buildings and grounds, was invited to appear tonight before the city council's municipal service and safety committee.

The committee held up its recommendation two weeks ago when the state highway commission raised the question as to how U. S. Highway 151 should be rerouted under the proposed change.

A sequel last week was a letter from Gallistel to Police Traffic Capt. J. Homer Elder declaring the proposed left turn ban probably would force the university to close Bascom Hill drive to public travel from 7:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily.

Prohibited left turns at Park st., Gallistel wrote, may mean left turns onto the university campus at Agricultural hall and Charter st., thereby creating serious congestion on Linden and Bascom Hill drives.

Replying, Elder said he was sure Gallistel's fears were unfounded, as he felt that any traffic which ordinarily would turn left on Park will turn right at Mills or Brooks and circle the block to the left. Motorists are not likely to "circle the hilly campus" when the other route is available, he held.

Elder also told Gallistel that he has had numerous pedestrian complaints, which he found to have merit, since the fall term opened at the university, because the 14-second cycle now allowed for pedestrians is insufficient to handle the pedestrian traffic of 1,744 persons hourly during the daytime.

## Stagg Denies He Plans Retirement

EL PASO, Tex.—(U.P.)—Amos Alonzo Stagg, 84-year-old head coach of the College of the Pacific, flatly denied Tuesday a report that he is ready to announce his voluntary retirement after 57 years of football coaching.

"This story is false in every detail," he said when shown a copy of a dispatch from San Francisco which said Stagg plans to announce next Saturday that he will give up his grid activity at the end of the season.

"Somebody must have been short of material for a story," he added.
