Joan Fontaine and Mark Stevens will re-enact the rôles they played on the screen when the Radio theatre presents "From this Day Forward," at 9 p. m. Monday over CBS.

A tale of modern marriage, the play chronicles the triumphs and disappointments that befall Bill and Susan Cummings. The plot unfolds in flashbacks as Bill, a returned veteran, reviews the past while answering forms at the U. S. Employment Service bureau.
