Surplus Sales Exceeds Hopes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—
(INS)—Secretary of State Brynes
reported today that the return so
far obtained for overseas surplus
property has far exceeded the to-
tal hoped for at the beginning of
the disposal program.

Bynes submitted to congress the
report of the Foreign Liquidation
Commissioner, which showed that
by Sept. 30, 1946, property with
original cost to the United States
of \$5,870,000,000 had been sold
for \$1,400,000,000.
