River Dragged In Child Search

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 16 —(UP)—Police dragged the Blue River today, guided by the directions of an "apparently normal" 17-year-old girl who told them she pushed a crippled child into the river "because he made me angry."

The girl, Frances Wanstreet, was held pending investigation of the disappearance of eight-year-old Ross Key, Jr., who vanished from his home in an industrial section of the city 12 days ago.

The girl, who lived next door to the crippled child, told police that his dog annoyed her by barking. She pushed him into the river, she said, after he had knocked freshly laundered clothes to the ground as she hung them on a line in her backyard.

Frances led police to the river bank near her home last night and designated the spot where little Ross last was seen at play. While police and firemen dragged the river for three hours, Frances and the missing boy's parents stood on the bank and watched.

Police kept the girl and the child's parents apart during the
