

Benny Finally Offers Satire Of Hemingway's 'The Killers'

The Jack Benny program Sunday at 7 p. m. over NBC will feature Benny's delayed satire on Ernest Hemingway's "The Killers," with movie star Edward G. Robinson as guest. Robinson, the greatest of screen killers, will enact one of the title roles in the Waukegan Wit's burlesque of Hemingway's fast-moving tale of murder, robbery and assorted violence.

Ezio Pinza, leading basso of the Metropolitan Opera company, will be a guest of Patrice Munsel and musical conductor Al Goodman on the "Family Hour" broadcast at 5 p. m. on CBS.

Charles Boyer, "great lover" of the screen, will pay a call to Fred Allen at 8:30 p. m. over NBC.

James Melton will have Josephine Hull of "Harvey" as guest star in a Thanksgiving drama, especially written for her, and a program of music appropriate to the holiday season on "Harvest of Stars" at 2:30 p. m. over NBC.

Henry Morgan, comedian, will present a capsule version of his program, "Here's Morgan," when Kate Smith Sings," at 6:30 p. m. on CBS.

Movements one and three from the melodic "Concerto No. 2 in C. Minor," and "The Rock (Fantasia for Orchestra)," by the Russian composer, Rachmaninof, will be heard over Mutual as Sylvan Levin conducts the orchestra for a half hour of "Symphonic Notes," at 7 p. m.

Jack Benny, who once demanded \$1 cash immediately after answering Phil Baker's first question, has vowed to make an all-or-nothing try at the \$64 question, when he guest stars on Baker's "Take It or Leave It" at 10 p. m. on CBS.

Amvets Agree To Mergers

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 23—(AP)—American Veterans of World War II (Amvets), holding their second annual convention here, passed a resolution submitted by the Pennsylvania delegation yesterday empowering the national executive committee to amalgamate with any other World War II veterans organization that subscribes to the Amvets' constitution.

The convention previously rejected after heated debate a resolution offered by California members opposing amalgamation of Amvets with the American Veterans committee "or any similar organization."

Cavalry Marks 80th Birthday

TOKYO, Nov. 23 — (AP) — Eleven officers and men who saw World War II service with the Eighth Cavalry regiment helped celebrate its 80th birthday today.
