PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7—(INS)—A Portland war veteran and his wife displayed letters of congratulations from the mayor today and of eviction from the landlord—because they have had a baby.

Mayor Earl Riley wrote Jack Dulong that "the arrival of a new citizen is an event that means much to your future happiness and much to the city of Portland."

His landlord wrote: "Babies are not allowed in the apartment so you must vacate in 30 days."

Dulong, who rented the apartment 18 months ago after an eight months' hitch in the Army, said he cannot find another on such short notice.

The landlord waved a rental contract and declared: "they knew months ago that they were going to have a baby and would have to get out."

As for babies, he said: "They annoy the other tenants. They feed them now every three or four hours whether they need it or not. During the war we had four here but that was during the war emer-
