Army Lists 1,202 ETO Deaths in '46

FRANKFURT, Germany, Dec. 30 — (AP)—The U. S. Army's fatality report for 1946 showed today 1,202 deaths among American soldiers and civilians in Europe, with only 162 (or 15 per cent) from natural causes.

Traffic accidents took the heaviest toll, 453.

There were 28 suicides, 26 homicides, 154 fatal "shooting incidents", mostly accidental, 45 killed in airplane crashes, 95 drownings, 27 fatal cases of alcoholism, 25 of poisoning, 49 of burns, 39 deaths in falls, 67 miscellaneous cases of violence and 32 deaths of undetermined cause.
