Cancer Studies May Halt No. 2 Killer's Climb

Cancer research to date leads to sorting cases into two basic groups, the first consisting of cancer which apparently originates in the body without external provocation, and the second group caused by irritation of once normal body cells.

This second group indicates strongly that we can now consider cancer preventable to a far greater extent than we have in the past, and that, if we learn to apply what knowledge we have of this baffling disease, we may succeed in halting the discouraging climb in cancer cases and deaths from year to year.

Here are some of the outside forces which apparently produce cancer:

Sunburn, especially among those who are past middle age.

Tar, oil and gasoline, which, if left on the hands, can produce skin cancer. Frequent washing combats this threat.

There is a growing conviction that smokers who inhale are contributing to the great increase in lung tumors.

Many cancer specialists believe that the hurried swallowing of scalding liquids, the gulping of a noon sandwich washed down with hot coffee, invite stomach cancer.

Cancer is no gentle killer—it can torture a person for years before causing death. Early treatment is next best to prevention.

Countless cases of cancer of the mouth, tongue, cheek, and tonsils are clearly preventable through correcting such external irritants as pyorrhea, ill-fitting dentures, and broken or sharp teeth, and by cutting down on excessive smoking, the research workers believe.

Bear in mind that this sly disease has been Wisconsin's second leading death cause in every year since 1920, and that it has cost

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
